1. Pursuan to the provisions of reference (a), Petitioner applied to this Board requesting her naval record be corrected to show a more favorable type of discharge than the general discharge issued on 17 March 1987.

2. The Board, consisting of Mr. [REDACTED], Mr. [REDACTED] and Mr. [REDACTED] reviewed Petitioner's allegations of error and injustice on 16 June 2010 and, pursuant to its regulations, determined that the corrective action indicated below should be taken on the available evidence of record. Documentary material considered by the Board consisted of the enclosures, naval records, and applicable statutes, regulations and policies.

3. The Board, having reviewed all the facts of record pertaining to Petitioner's allegations of error and injustice, finds as follows:

a. Before applying to this Board, Petitioner exhausted all administrative remedies available under existing law and regulations within the Department of the Navy.

b. Petitioner enlisted in the Navy on 24 January 1986. On 29 October 1986 a search of Petitioner's room uncovered love letters to another woman.

c. On 5 February 1987 Petitioner's commanding officer recommended that she be separated from the Navy with a general discharge by reason of homosexuality. After review by the discharge authority, the recommendation was approved and Petitioner was discharged with a general discharge on 17 March 1987.

d. At the time of Petitioner's discharge, character of service for Sailor's not discharged for cause was based, in part, on conduct and overall trait averages, both of which were computed from marks assigned during periodic evaluations.

Petitioner's conduct and overall trait averages were 3.2 and 3.5, respectively. The minimum average marks required for a fully honorable characterization of service on 17 March 1987 were 3.0 in conduct and 2.8 in overall traits.

e. Reference (b) sets forth the Department of the Navy's current policies, standards and procedures for administratively separating enlisted service members. With regard to homosexuality, reference (b) declares such behavior to be incompatible with naval service. It provides Navy and Marine Corps officials with the authority to involuntarily separate those service member's who commit a homosexual act or acts. If separated, the service member's discharge and character of service must be based on his or her total performance of duty and conduct. Reference (b) expressly prohibits the issuance of a discharge under conditions other than honorable unless the individuals committed a homosexual act under one of the following circumstances:

- (1) By using force, coercion, or intimidation;
- (2) with a person under 16 years of age;
- (3) with a subordinate in circumstances that violates customary naval super-subordinate relationships;
- (4) openly in public view;
- (5) for compensation;
- (6) aboard a naval vessel or aircraft; or
- (7) in another location subject to military control under aggravating circumstances noted in the finding that have an adverse impact on discipline and good order, or morale comparable to the impact of such activity aboard a vessel or aircraft.

In Petitioner's case, her military records fail to disclose the presence of any aggravating circumstances which would warrant the issuance of a discharge under other than honorable conditions under the provisions of reference (b).

CONCLUSION:

Upon review and consideration of all the evidence of record the Board concludes that Petitioner's request warrants favorable action. Based upon Petitioner's overall record of service and current Department of the Navy policy as established in reference (b), the Board concludes that it would be in the interests of justice to apply the standards of reference (b) to Petitioner's case. The Board finds that given Petitioner's final conduct and overall trait averages, relief in the form of recharacterization to honorable is appropriate.

RECOMMENDATION:

a. That Petitioner's naval record be corrected to show that she was issued an honorable discharge by reason of homosexuality on 17 March 1987 vice the general discharge actually issued on that date.

b. That a copy of this Report of Proceedings be filed in Petitioner's naval record.


