

The Board, however, determined that your page 11 entry is valid. In this regard, the Board noted that pursuant to the Marine Corps Separation and Retirement Manual (MARCORSEPMAN), you were issued a page 11 entry counseling you for violating Article 1165, U.S. Navy Regulations by engaging in an unduly familiar relationship with a subordinate and displaying a lapse in professional judgment not commensurate with your grade. The Board also noted that you were properly counseled and determined that the contested entry was written and issued according to the Marine Corps Individual Records Administration Manual (IRAM). Specifically, the entry provided written notification concerning your deficiencies, specific recommendations for corrective action, where to seek assistance, the consequences for failure to take corrective action, and it afforded you the opportunity to submit a rebuttal. Moreover, your commanding officer (CO) determined that your misconduct was a matter essential to record, as it was his/her right to do. The Board noted, too, that you acknowledged the perceptions your actions caused, you took full responsibility, and took corrective action. The Board also determined that based upon the Preliminary Inquiry, your CO had sufficient knowledge of the circumstances and your CO acted within his/her discretionary authority when determining that your page 11 entry was warranted. Lastly, to remove duplicate material from your record, you must exhaust your administrative remedies by submitting a request to the Headquarters Marine Corps, MMRP organizational mailbox: smb.manpower.MMRP@usmc.mil. Accordingly, the Board concluded that there is no probable material error, substantive inaccuracy, or injustice warranting corrective action.

You are entitled to have the Board reconsider its decision upon submission of new matters, which will require you to complete and submit a new DD Form 149. New matters are those not previously presented to or considered by the Board. In this regard, it is important to keep in mind that a presumption of regularity attaches to all official records. Consequently, when applying for a correction of an official naval record, the burden is on the applicant to demonstrate the existence of probable material error or injustice.
