1. Pursuant to the provisions of reference (a), Subject, hereinafter referred to as Petitioner, filed enclosure (1) with the Board for Correction of Naval Records (Board), requesting that his naval record be corrected to upgrade his character of service to honorable, change the narrative reason for separation listed on his discharge documents in accordance with reference (b) and (c). Enclosure (2) applies.

2. The Board consisting of ██████████, reviewed Petitioner's allegations of error and injustice on 12 August 2022 and, pursuant to its regulations, determined that the corrective action indicated below should be taken. Documentary material considered by the Board consisted of Petitioner's application together with all material submitted in support thereof, relevant portions of Petitioner's naval record, and applicable statutes, regulations, and policies, to include the 25 July 2018 guidance from the Under Secretary of Defense for Personnel and Readiness regarding equity, injustice or clemency determinations (Wilkie Memo).

3. The Board, having reviewed all the facts of record pertaining to Petitioner's allegations of error and injustice finds as follows:

a. Before applying to this Board, Petitioner exhausted all administrative remedies available under existing law and regulations within the Department of the Navy.

b. Although enclosure (1) was not filed in a timely manner, it is in the interest of justice to review the application on its merits.

c. Petitioner enlisted in the Navy and began a period of active service on 27 July 1981. Petitioner received non-judicial punishment (NJP) for disobeying a lawful order and UA from his appointed place of duty.

d. On 26 August 1992, Petitioner underwent a medical evaluation and submitted a statement admitting to engaging in homosexual acts. As a result, Petitioner was notified of the initiation of administrative separation proceedings by reason of homosexual conduct, at which point, Petitioner waived his right to consult with counsel, and his right to a hearing before an administrative discharge board (ADB). Subsequently, Petitioner's commanding officer recommended his discharged with a General (Under Honorable Conditions) (GEN) character of service. On 27 September 1982, the separation authority approved and directed Petitioner's discharge. On 13 October 1992, Petitioner was discharged with a GEN by reason of homosexuality. He was issued a RE-4 reentry code and a SPD code of HRA.

e. References (b) and (c) set forth the Department of the Navy's current policies, standards, and procedures for correction of military records following the "don't ask, don't tell" (DADT) repeal of 10 U.S.C. 654. It provides service Discharge Review Boards with the guidance to grant requests to change the characterization of service to "Honorable," narrative reason for discharge to "Secretarial Authority," SPD code to "JFF," and reentry code to "RE-1J," when the original discharge was based solely on DADT or a similar policy in place prior to enactment of it and there are no aggravating factors in the record, such as misconduct.

f. Petitioner contends that he had no aggravating factors such as misconduct during his service and, since his discharge, he has successfully served 35 years with the United States Government.

CONCLUSION:

Upon review and consideration of all the evidence of record, the Board concludes that Petitioner's request warrants relief. In this regard, the Board noted Petitioner's overall record of military service and current Department of the Navy policy, as established in references (b) and (c). While the Board noted Petitioner's misconduct, the Board determined he was administratively processed and separated based solely on his homosexual admission. Therefore, the Board determined no aggravating factors exist in Petitioner's record and he qualified for full relief under existing policy.

In view of the above, the Board directs the following corrective action.

RECOMMENDATION:

That Petitioner's be issued a new Certificate of Release or Discharge from Active Duty (DD Form 214) indicating "Honorable" character of service, "Secretarial Authority" narrative reason for separation, "RE-1J" reenlistment code, "JFF" separation code, and "MILPERSMAN 1910-164" separation authority.

That a copy of this report of proceedings be filed in Petitioner's naval record.

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4. It is certified that a quorum was present at the Board's review and deliberations, and that the foregoing is a true and complete record of the Board's proceedings in the above entitled matter.

5. Pursuant to the delegation of authority set out in Section 6(e) of the revised Procedures of the Board for Correction of Naval Records (32 Code of Federal Regulation, Section 723.6(e)) and having assured compliance with its provisions, it is hereby announced that the foregoing corrective action, taken under the authority of reference (a), has been approved by the Board on behalf of the Secretary of the Navy.
