



The Board carefully considered all potentially mitigating factors to determine whether the interests of justice warrant relief in your case in accordance with the Wilkie Memo. These included, but were not limited to, your desire to have your “service in Vietnam during Temporary Duty Assignment during the months of August 1969 to October 1969” be reflected in your official military personnel file (OMPF). You contend the period is missing from your record.

Based upon this review, the Board concluded your potentially mitigating factors were insufficient to warrant relief. After a detailed review of your record, the Board determined that your OMPF does not provide evidence to substantiate your request. While the Board noted the MUC citation, they concluded this was insufficient evidence to support the specific relief you are requesting. Accordingly, given the totality of the circumstances, the Board determined that your request does not merit relief.

You are entitled to have the Board reconsider its decision upon submission of new matters, which will require you to complete and submit a new DD Form 149. New matters are those not previously presented to or considered by the Board. In this regard, it is important to keep in mind that a presumption of regularity attaches to all official records. Consequently, when applying for a correction of an official naval record, the burden is on the applicant to demonstrate the existence of probable material error or injustice.
