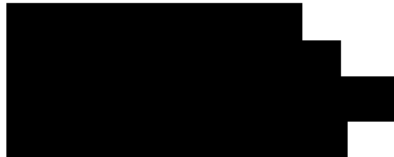

Dear Petitioner:

This is in reference to your application for correction of your naval record pursuant to Title 10, United States Code, Section 1552. After careful and conscientious consideration of relevant portions of your naval record and your application, the Board for Correction of Naval Records (Board) found the evidence submitted insufficient to establish the existence of probable material error or injustice. Consequently, your application has been denied.

Because your application was submitted with new evidence not previously considered, the Board found it in the interest of justice to review your application. A three-member panel of the Board, sitting in executive session, considered your application on 26 January 2023. The names and votes of the panel members will be furnished upon request. Your allegations of error and injustice were reviewed in accordance with administrative regulations and procedures applicable to the proceedings of the Board. Documentary material considered by the Board consisted of your application together with all material submitted in support thereof, relevant portions of your naval record, applicable statutes, regulations, and policies, to include the 25 August 2017 guidance from the Office of the Under Secretary of Defense for Personnel and Readiness (Kurta Memo), the 3 September 2014 guidance from the Secretary of Defense regarding discharge upgrade requests by Veterans claiming post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD)/mental health condition (MHC) (Hagel Memo), and the 25 July 2018 guidance from the Under Secretary of Defense for Personnel and Readiness regarding equity, injustice, or clemency determinations (Wilkie Memo).

The Board determined that your personal appearance, with or without counsel, would not materially add to the understanding of the clear and specific issues involved in your request for reconsideration. Therefore, the Board determined a personal appearance was not necessary and considered your case based on evidence of record.

You previously applied to this Board for a change to your narrative reason for separation and were denied on 31 July 2023. The facts of your case remain substantially unchanged.

The Board carefully considered all potentially mitigating factors to determine whether the interests of justice warrant relief in your case in accordance with the Kurta, Hagel, and Wilkie Memos. The Board noted that both you and the in-person witness statement provided on your behalf state that your ship provided you with alcohol prior to your alcohol-related motorcycle crash. However, the Board noted that you could have chosen not to drink and, more importantly, that you could have chosen not to drive your motorcycle. The Board reviewed the additional material you submitted regarding your post-discharge medical condition as well as your personal statement regarding your receipt of veteran benefits. However, the Board concluded that this additional information did not present any new, material fact of consequence which would alter the Board's original determination that you were appropriately discharged based on the findings of a physical evaluation board (PEB) that you were unfit as a result of your misconduct. More importantly, neither would the information you have submitted for reconsideration alter the fact that the PEB was bound by the line of duty/misconduct determination which found that your injuries were due to your own willful misconduct and not simple neglect. Therefore, while the Board carefully considered the evidence you submitted in mitigation, even in light of the Kurta, Hagel, and Wilkie Memos and reviewing the record liberally and holistically, the Board did not find evidence of an error or injustice that warrants granting you the relief you requested or granting relief as a matter of clemency or equity. Accordingly, given the totality of the circumstances, the Board determined that your request does not merit relief.

You are entitled to have the Board reconsider its decision upon the submission of new matters, which will require you to complete and submit a new DD Form 149. New matters are those not previously presented to or considered by the Board. In this regard, it is important to keep in mind that a presumption of regularity is attached to all official records. Consequently, when applying for a correction of an official naval record, the burden is on the applicant to demonstrate the existence of probable material error or injustice.
