 correction of his DD Form 214 (Armed Forces of the United States Report of Transfer or Discharge) to show his Bronze Star Medal

• his record reflects all of his awards received on active-duty

## APPLICANT'S SUPPORTING DOCUMENT(S) CONSIDERED BY THE BOARD:

- DD Form 149 (Application for Correction of Military Record)
- Bronze Star Medal Certificate, 25 June 1971
- DD Form 214

## FACTS:

- 1. The applicant did not file within the 3-year time frame provided in Title 10, U.S. Code, section 1552(b); however, the Army Board for Correction of Military Records (ABCMR) conducted a substantive review of this case and determined it is in the interest of justice to excuse the applicant's failure to timely file.
- 2. The applicant provides a certificate that shows he was awarded the Bronze Star Medal for his meritorious achievement in ground operations against hostile forces during the period Augst 1970 to August 1971 in Vietnam, 25 June 1971.
- 3. The applicant's record is not available for review; however, his DD Form 214 shows the following:
- a. The applicant has prior service in the U.S. Army Reserve. His commissioned date is unknown. On 13 August 1968, he was placed on active duty.
  - b. On 11 August 1971, he was honorably released from active duty.
  - c. He completed 2 years, 11 months, and 29 days of net active service.

- d. He was awarded the National Defense Service Medal, Vietnam Service Medal, Republic of Vietnam Campaign Medal with Device (1960), and two overseas service bars.
- e. He has service in Vietnam from 7 August 1970 to 2 August 1971 (two campaigns).
- 4. A review of the Awards and Decorations Computer-Assisted Retrieval System, an index of general orders issued during the Vietnam era between 1965 and 1973 maintained by the U.S. Army Human Resources Command Military Awards Branch, failed to reveal any orders for the Purple Heart pertaining to the applicant.

#### **BOARD DISCUSSION:**

- 1. After reviewing the application, all supporting documents, and the evidence found within the military record, the Board found that relief was warranted. The Board carefully considered the applicant's record of service, documents submitted in support of the petition and executed a comprehensive and standard review based on law, policy and regulation. One possible determination was to deny relief due to the absence of official orders, with only a certificate for the Bronze Star Medal. However, upon review of the applicant's petition and available military records, the Board considered the absence of official orders and the presence of only a certificate for the Bronze Star Medal. During deliberation, the Board concluded that despite the lack of a DA Form 638 recommendation, there is sufficient evidence to justify correcting the applicant's record to reflect the award.
- 2. The Board found that the applicant's certificate, which recognizes meritorious achievement in ground operations against hostile forces during the period of August 1970 to August 1971 in the Republic of Vietnam, was adequate justification. As a result, the Board granted relief to officially award the Bronze Star Medal.
- 3. Prior to closing the case, the Board did note the analyst of record administrative notes below, and recommended the correction is completed to more accurately depict the military service of the applicant.



#### BOARD DETERMINATION/RECOMMENDATION:

In addition to the administrative notes annotated by the Analyst of Record (below the signature), the Board determined the evidence presented is sufficient to warrant a recommendation for relief. As a result, the Board recommends that all Department of Army records of the individual concerned be corrected by amending his DD Form 214 by adding in item 24 (Decorations, Medals, Badges, Citations and Campaign Ribbons Awarded or Authorized) – Bronze Star Medal.

#### ADMINISTRATIVE NOTE(S):

A review of the applicant's records show he was awarded or authorized the following awards not reflected on his DD Form 214. As a result, amend his DD Form 214 to show:

- two bronze service stars to his previously issued Vietnam Service Medal
- Republic of Vietnam Gallantry Cross with Palm Unit Citation

#### REFERENCES:

- 1. Army Regulation 15-185 (Army Board for Correction of Military Records) prescribes the policies and procedures for correction of military records by the Secretary of the Army acting through the ABCMR.
- a. The ABCMR begins its consideration of each case with the presumption of administrative regularity. The applicant has the burden of proving an error or injustice by a preponderance of the evidence.
- b. The ABCMR may, in its discretion, hold a hearing (sometimes referred to as an evidentiary hearing or an administrative hearing) or request additional evidence or opinions. Applicants do not have a right to a hearing before the ABCMR. The Director or the ABCMR may grant a formal hearing whenever justice requires.
- 2. Army Regulation 600-8-22 (Military Awards) prescribes Army policy, criteria, and administrative instructions concerning individual and unit military awards.
- a. The Bronze Star Medal is awarded in time of war for heroism and for meritorious achievement or service, not involving participation in aerial flight, in connection with military operations against an armed enemy, or while engaged in military operations involving conflict with an opposing armed force in which the United States is not a belligerent party. As with all personal decorations, formal recommendations, approval through the chain of command, and announcement in orders are required.
- b. A bronze service star is worn on the appropriate service ribbon, to include the Vietnam Service Medal, for each credited campaign.
- c. Department of the Army General Orders Number 8, dated 1974, announced award of the Republic of Vietnam Gallantry Cross with Palm Unit Citation to Headquarters, U.S. Military Assistance Command and its subordinate units during the period 8 February 1962 to 28 March 1973 and to Headquarters, U.S. Army Vietnam and its subordinate units during the period 20 July 1965 to 28 March 1973.
- 3. Army Regulation 635-5 (Separation Documents), prescribed the separation documents that would be furnished each individual who was separated from the Army including Active-Duty Training personnel and established standardized procedures for the preparation and distribution of these documents. All available records would be used as a basis for the preparation of the DD Form 214, including DA Form 20. In item 24, enter from section 9, all decorations, service medals, campaign credits, and badges awarded or authorized, omitting authorities cited therein.
- 4. Army Regulation 15-185 (Army Board for Correction of Military Records) prescribes
