APPLICANT REQUESTS: correction of his DD Form 214 (Armed Forces of the United States Report of Transfer or Discharge) to show in item 1 (Last Name, First Name, Middle Name) his first name as [REDACTED].

FACTS:

1. The applicant did not file within the 3-year time frame provided in Title 10, U.S. Code, section 1552(b); however, the Army Board for Correction of Military Records (ABCMR) conducted a substantive review of this case and determined it is in the interest of justice to excuse the applicant's failure to timely file.
2. The applicant states he is requesting a change in his DD Form 214 to reflect his first name as Daniel, to match all of his identification documents. His application to the Small Business Administration was rejected because it does not match the name on his DD Form 214. He was hopeful he could remain in service; however, he was unsuccessful after exhausting all appeals of his medical discharge.
3. The applicant provides:
  - a. Two letters, and a memorandum during his active duty service, Special Orders Number 295, and his U.S. passport as proof of his identification and the requested name.

b. His Honorable Discharge Certificate, which shows the contested name.

4. A review of the applicant's service record shows:

a. He was inducted into the Army of the U.S. on 25 October 1966. His DD Form 47 (Record of Induction) shows in Block 1 (Last Name – First Name – Middle Name) [REDACTED]

b. The below documents list the applicant's contested first name:

- DA Form 20 (Enlisted Qualification Record)
- Medical Board Proceedings, 19 December 1966

c. The applicant's contested first name is listed consistently throughout the service record.

d. On 28 December 1966, he was honorably discharged from active duty. His DD Form 214 shows he completed 2 months, and 4 days of active service. Item 1 lists the applicant's contested first name.

5. By regulation (AR 635-8), the DD Form 214 is a summary of the Soldier's most recent period of continuous active duty. It provides a brief, clear-cut record of all current active, prior active, and prior inactive duty service at the time of release from active duty, retirement, or discharge. The information entered thereon reflects the conditions as they existed at the time of separation. Block 1 (Name) states compare original enlistment contract or appointment order and review official record for possible name changes. If a name change has occurred list other names of record in Block 18 (Remarks).

#### BOARD DISCUSSION:

1. After reviewing the application, all supporting documents, and the evidence found within the military record, the Board found that relief was not warranted. The Board carefully considered the applicant's record of service, documents submitted in support of the petition, and executed a comprehensive review based on law, policy, and regulation. The evidence presented does not demonstrate the existence of a probable error or injustice. The applicant used the contested name during his entire period of service. The Board determined the overall merits of this case are insufficient as a basis for correction of the records of the individual concerned. Based on the service record and a preponderance of the evidence, the Board denied relief.

2. The Army has an interest in maintaining the integrity of its records for historical purposes. The information in those records must reflect the conditions and circumstances that existed at the time the records were created. In the absence of evidence that shows a material error or injustice, there is a reluctance to recommend that those records be changed.

3. The applicant is advised that a copy of this decisional document, along with his application and the supporting evidence he provided, will be filed in his official military records. This should serve to clarify any questions or confusion regarding the difference in the name recorded in his military records and to satisfy his desire to have his name documented in his military records.

This provision of law also allows the ABCMR to excuse an applicant's failure to timely file within the 3-year statute of limitations if the ABCMR determines it would be in the interest of justice to do so.
