This is in reference to your application for correction of your naval record pursuant to the provisions of Title 10, United States Code, Section 1552.

A three-member panel of the Board for Correction of Naval Records, sitting in executive session, considered your application on 6 June 2001. Your allegations of error and injustice were reviewed in accordance with administrative regulations and procedures applicable to the proceedings of this Board. Documentary material considered by the Board consisted of your application, together with all material submitted in support thereof, your naval record and applicable statutes, regulations and policies.

After careful and conscientious consideration of the entire record, the Board found that the evidence submitted was insufficient to establish the existence of probable material error or injustice.

The Board found that you enlisted in the Navy on 14 December 1959 at age 17. The record reflects that you received three nonjudicial punishments and were convicted by a special court-martial. The offenses included unauthorized absences totalling four days, disorderly conduct while in uniform in a public place, failure to obey a lawful order, stealing a life jacket, stealing a white jumper, and breaking restriction.

A second special court-martial convened on 11 May 1962 and you were found guilty of unauthorized absences totalling 27 days, stealing a car, and breaking restriction. The court sentenced you to confinement for four months, forfeitures of \$70 per month for four months, reduction in pay grade, and a bad conduct discharge. You received the bad conduct discharge on 31 August 1962.

In its review of your application the Board carefully weighed all potentially mitigating factors, such as your youth and immaturity. However, the Board concluded that these factors were

not sufficient to warrant recharacterization of your discharge due to the fact that during a period of less than three years, you were the subject of five disciplinary actions. Based on the foregoing, the Board concluded that no change to the discharge is warranted. Accordingly, your application has been denied. The names and votes of the members of the panel will be furnished upon request.

It is regretted that the circumstances of your case are such that favorable action cannot be taken. You are entitled to have the Board reconsider its decision upon submission of new and material evidence or other matter not previously considered by the Board. In this regard, it is important to keep in mind that a presumption of regularity attaches to all official records. Consequently, when applying for a correction of an official naval record, the burden is on the applicant to demonstrate the existence of probable material error or injustice.
