- 1. Pursuant to the provisions of reference (a), Petitioner, a former sailor, filed enclosure (1) with this Board requesting that his Certificate of Release or Discharge from Active Duty (DD Form 214) be corrected to reflect as the "most significant duty assignment". Enclosure (1) applies.
- 2. The Board, consisting of Petitioner's allegations of error and injustice on 31 October 2017 and, pursuant to its regulations, determined that the corrective action indicated below should be taken on the available evidence of record. Documentary material considered by the Board consisted of the enclosures, relevant portions of naval records, and applicable statutes, regulations, and policies. In addition, the Board considered the advisory opinion (AO) provided by Navy Personnel Command (PERS-312) dated 18 October 2017.
- 3. The Board, having reviewed all the facts of record pertaining to Petitioner's allegations of error and injustice finds as follows:
- a. Before applying to this Board, Petitioner exhausted all administrative remedies available under existing law and regulations within the Department of the Navy.
- b. Petitioner was issued a DD Form 214 with block 28 as his "most significant duty assignment".
- c. Petitioner considers his time on as his most significant duty station because he survived a shipboard explosion during his tour of duty.
- d. In correspondence attached as enclosure (2), the office having cognizance over the subject matter addressed in Petitioner's application has commented to the effect that reference (b) states that block 28 should contain the name of the ship, station, or organization "the individual

considers to have been the most significant duty to which assigned during the current period of active duty."

CONCLUSION:

Upon review and consideration of all the evidence of record, the Board concludes that Petitioner's request warrants favorable action.

The Board notes it is in the interest of justice to correct block 28 to reflect Petitioner's choice of "most significant duty assignment" on his DD Form 214.

In view of the foregoing, the Board finds the existence of an error warranting the following corrective action.

RECOMMENDATION:

Petitioner's naval record be corrected to show that his most significant duty assignment was USS when he was discharged on 2 February 1955.

Petitioner shall be issued a DD Form 215 reflecting most significant duty assignment.

A copy of this report of proceedings be filed in Petitioner's naval record.

Upon request, the Department of Veterans Affairs be informed that Petitioner's application was received by the Board on 11 July 2017.

4. It is certified that a quorum was present at the Board's review and deliberations, and that the foregoing is a true and complete record of the Board's proceedings in the above entitled matter.
