



A review of your record reflects that you enlisted in the U.S. Marine Corps Reserve on 16 July 2003 for 8 years. You completed Initial Active Duty Training from 21 January 2004 through 3 August 2004. Followed by three periods of Annual Training: 1 April 2005 to 15 April 2005 (15 days); 28 July 2006 to 10 August 2006 (14 days); and 15 April 2007 to 30 April 2007 (15 days). Thereafter, you executed active duty orders for Recruiter's Assistance in ■ from 6 April 2009 to 19 June 2009 for a period of 2 months and 14 days. On 20 June 2009, you were joined back to a Selected Marine Corps Reserve drilling status until your transfer to the Individual Ready Reserve (IRR) effective on 22 March 2010. You remained in the IRR until your discharge from the U.S. Marine Corps Reserve on 15 July 2011. The Board could not find, nor did you provide evidence of completing active duty of at least 90-consecutive days after 3 August 2004, therefore the Board determined a change to your record is not warranted.

You are entitled to have the Board reconsider its decision upon submission of new matters, which will require you to complete and submit a new DD Form 149. New matters are those not previously presented to or considered by the Board. In this regard, it is important to keep in mind that a presumption of regularity attaches to all official records. Consequently, when applying for a correction of an official naval record, the burden is on the applicant to demonstrate the existence of probable material error or injustice.
