
Dear ,

This is in reference to your application for correction of your naval record pursuant to Section 1552 of Title 10, United States Code. After careful and conscientious consideration of relevant portions of your naval record and your application, the Board for Correction of Naval Records (Board) found the evidence submitted insufficient to establish the existence of probable material error or injustice. Consequently, your application has been denied.


A three-member panel of the Board, sitting in executive session, considered your application on 29 July 2025. The names and votes of the members of the panel will be furnished upon request. Your allegations of error and injustice were reviewed in accordance with administrative regulations and procedures applicable to the proceedings of this Board. Documentary material considered by the Board consisted of your application, together with all material submitted in support thereof, relevant portions of your naval record and applicable statutes, regulations, and policies. In addition, the Board considered the advisory opinion contained in Commander, Navy Personnel Command memorandum 1900 PERS-312/SA of 17 April 2025, which was previously provided to you for comment.

On 29 April 1967, you graduated from the Bachelor of Science Degree in Marine Engineering. Furthermore, on 10 April 1967, an Appointment as Reserve Officer in United States Navy Acceptance and Oath of Office was issued, with a designator code of 1105 in the inactive U.S. Naval Reserve as an Ensign with a date of rank of 29 April 1967. You/witness signed this form on 29 April 1967.

You were released from active duty with an honorable character of service and were issued a Certificate of Release or Discharge from Active Duty (DD Form 214) for the period of 16 November 1968 to 10 March 1969 upon completion of required active service. Furthermore, the following is provided: block 12f (Foreign service) listed blank, block 12g (Sea service) listed blank, and block 13 (Decorations, medals, badges, citations and campaign ribbons awarded or authorized) listed National Defense Service Medal.




You were released from active duty with an honorable character of service and were issued a DD Form 214 for the period of 20 October 1969 to 15 June 1970 upon completion of required active service. Furthermore, the following is provided: block 12f (Foreign service) listed blank, block 12g (Sea service) listed blank, and block 13 (Decorations, medals, badges, citations and campaign ribbons awarded or authorized) listed National Defense Service Medal.




On 16 December 1992, Secretary of the Navy notified you that By direction of the President, and pursuant to Title 10, U. S. Code, Section 1162, you are hereby honorably discharged from the U. S. Naval Reserve effective 30 September 1991.

On 5 March 2025, Naval Personnel Command issued Subject a Statement of Service for Naval Reserve Retirement for the period of 29 April 1967 to 30 September 1991 that listed the following: Qualifying Years of Service: 6 years. Total Retirement Points Creditable for Pay: 1159.

On 17 April 2025, Navy Personnel Command, via Assistant for Board matters (PERS-3B) notified the Board that, "[a] complete review of Subject Named Officer's (SNO) Official Military Personnel File (OMPF), corporate data, and the document provided was conducted. The review revealed SNO was on active-duty training for 90 consecutive days from 11/16/1968 until 03/10/1969, 10/20/1969 until 06/15/1970 and was honorably discharged from the USNR on 09/30/1991. This is considered an administrative oversight and DD 214's and an honorable discharge certificate will be issued by this office. No evidence found to determine eligibility of the Service Medal."





You are entitled to have the Board reconsider its decision upon submission of new matters, which will require you to complete and submit a new DD Form 149. New matters are those not previously presented to or considered by the Board. In this regard, it is important to keep in mind that a presumption of regularity attaches to all official records. Consequently, when applying for a correction of an official naval record, the burden is on the applicant to demonstrate the existence of probable material error or injustice.
