

On 22 May 2024, you transferred from [REDACTED] and arrived at [REDACTED] on 24 May 2024 for duty under instruction.

In accordance with Current Career School Listing (CSL) published on 23 October 2024, rating-NEC/HM-L23A (Surgical Tech) with an OBLISERV of 5 years was listed with the following note:
1. MPM 1160-100 OUTLINES the OBLISERV requirements for Selective Training and Reenlistment (STAR) Program reenlistment.

On 11 December 2024, you were issued official change duty orders (BUPERS order: 3464), with required obligated service to February 2028, while stationed in [REDACTED] with an effective date of departure of January 2025. Your ultimate activity was [REDACTED] for duty with an effective date of arrival of 15 February 2025 with a PRD of February 2025.

In January 2025, you were awarded Navy Enlisted Classification (NEC) L23A.

On 15 January 2025, you reenlisted in the U.S. Navy for 6 years with an EAOS of 14 January 2031 and received a Zone A SRB.

On 16 January 2025, you transferred from [REDACTED] and arrived at [REDACTED] on 16 January 2025 for duty.

You requested to cancel the reenlistment of 7 November 2023 and the reenlistment of 15 January 2025 be designated under the STAR Program and advancement to PO2 in accordance with MILPERSMAN 1160-100. The Board, in its review of your entire record and application, carefully weighed all potentially mitigating factors, to include your assertions. However, the Board concluded that your reenlistment on 7 November 2023 cannot be cancelled because you were executing a component change. MILPERSMAN 1306-1502 states that a Sailor completing a component change is permanently transferred to the AC under a new AC enlistment contract to fill a shortfall in the Active Component. Furthermore, you are ineligible to have your reenlistment of 15 January 2025 designated under the STAR Program because it was your third enlistment. MILPERSMAN 1160-100 states that for STAR Program eligibility, a member must be on a first enlistment. The Board found no error or injustice to warrant a change to your record. In this connection, the Board substantially concurred with the comments contained in the aforementioned advisory opinion.

In the absence of sufficient new evidence for reconsideration, the decision of the Board is final, and your only recourse would be to seek relief, at no cost to the Board, from a court of appropriate jurisdiction.
