Dear ██████████,

This is in reference to your application for correction of your naval record pursuant to Section 1552 of Title 10, United States Code. After careful and conscientious consideration of relevant portions of your naval record and your application, the Board for Correction of Naval Records (Board) found the evidence submitted insufficient to establish the existence of probable material error or injustice. Consequently, your application has been denied.

A three-member panel of the Board, sitting in executive session, considered your application on 12 March 2026. The names and votes of the members of the panel will be furnished upon request. Your allegations of error and injustice were reviewed in accordance with administrative regulations and procedures applicable to the proceedings of this Board. Documentary material considered by the Board consisted of your application, together with all material submitted in support thereof, relevant portions of your naval record and applicable statutes, regulations, and policies.

You requested to move eight points from a previously satisfactory anniversary year to the unsatisfactory anniversary year ending on 21 December 2004 to make it a satisfactory year and be eligible for a reserve retirement. The Board, in its review of your entire record and application, carefully weighed all potentially mitigating factors, to include your assertions. You assert that, "I believe that my shortage of points gained in the 2004 or 2005 years was made in error as we drilled off site away from our units during both years. There as to be expected were many errors in attendance during those times and accountability was very underwhelming..." However, the Board concluded that you provided no evidence of your assertion that there was an error in your point total for anniversary year ending 21 December 2004. The advocacy letters provided insight into your professionalism and dedication, however neither letter was written by someone with firsthand knowledge of your assertions from events that happened prior to the end of 2004. In accordance with BUPERSINST 1001.39F, "[m]embers are responsible for ensuring that they accrue at least 50 points each anniversary year to obtain a qualifying year toward retirement." Therefore, the Board agreed that you were responsible for monitoring your record if you felt there were errors in attendance with underwhelming accountability, you would have been able to take steps to correct inaccuracies. Furthermore, you would have been immediately aware that you did not end that year
